Shakespeare wrote four plays between 1600 and 1606 that are considered the height of his achievement in tragedy: *Hamlet*, *Othello*, *King Lear* and *Macbeth*. Among the topics Dr. Schenker will consider in his presentation are: the tragic view of life, the nature of the tragic hero, the interconnectedness of good and evil, and the ways in which Shakespeare employs theater as symbol and metaphor. Participants do not have to have read or seen the plays in advance, but reviewing the plots of each in advance of the lecture will enhance your appreciation of the talk.

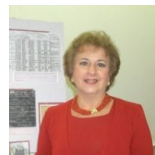

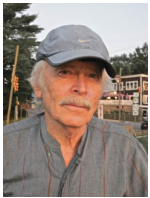

The Coldest Winter: America and the Korean War by David Halberstam (April 5, Part 6 to end)

Halberstam considered *The Coldest Winter* his most accomplished work, the culmination of forty-five years of writing about America's post-war foreign policy. Halberstam gives us a masterful narrative of the political decisions and miscalculations on both sides. He charts the disastrous path that led to the massive entry of Chinese forces near the Yalu River and that caught Douglas MacArthur and his soldiers by surprise. He provides astonishingly vivid and nuanced portraits of all the major figures - Eisenhower, Truman, Acheson, Kim, and Mao, and Generals MacArthur, Almond, and Ridgway. (*Amazon Book Description*)

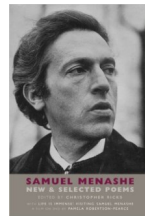

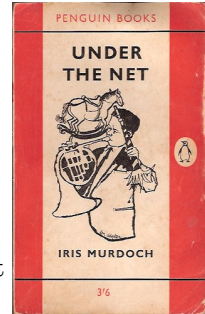
