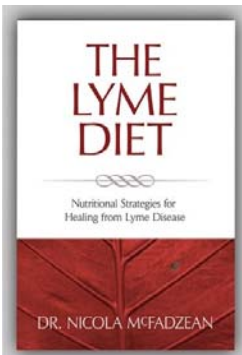
Four local singer/songwriters return to the Library to trade songs and share thoughts about songwriting, inspiration and creativity.

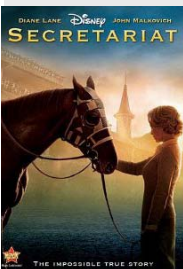
