Ridgefield Remembers the Civil War: A Community-Wide Series of Events in Commemoration of the 150th Anniversary of the Civil War

January through June 2013



The Civil War was one of the most transformative periods in our national history, and people across the country are observing its sesquicentennial with an outpouring of books, films and other educational and cultural activities. Seeking to tie these large historical events to local history, the organizers of *Ridgefield Remembers the Civil War* have put together numerous commemorative programs for all ages in the 6 months leading up to the anniversary of the July 1863 Battle of Gettysburg, in which Ridgefield soldiers took part. The culminating highlight of this effort will be a *Soldiers Fair* in Ballard Park on Saturday, June 8 from 1 to 4:30 PM (rain date June 9), to


