RIDGEFIELD INDEPENDENT FILM FESTIVAL



Ridgefield's Independent Film Festival (RIFF), the brainchild of local playwright and director Joanne Hudson, will be held Friday, May 20, Saturday, May 21 and Sunday, May 22, 2016 at various venues around town. RIFF's mission is: "to make the world a more compassionate place through the sharing of stories from around the globe through cinema and to give comfort and aid to the hardworking filmmaker who shares this vision."

The list of venues includes the Ridgefield Library, The Aldrich Contemporary Art Museum, the Ridgefield Playhouse, the Prospector Theater and Keeler Tavern Museum. Also, don't miss a free concert featuring selections of music from famous film scores performed by the Western Connecticut Youth Orchestra followed by a screening of *A Hard Day's Night* in Ballard Park on Friday, May 20 at 7:30 PM, as well as live music at RIFF Rocks the Park all day on Saturday in Ballard Park.

In addition to showcasing both national and international films, the festival will include panel discussions with accomplished filmmakers, master classes and workshops on film history and different aspects of filmmaking.

By far, the best way to "RIFF" is to purchase a pass. Currently, there are two: ALL FESTIVAL (\$53.49) which gives access to all films, master classes and special programming and ALL ACCESS (\$79.74) which, in addition to the afore-mentioned, provides access to our three parties, the welcome filmmakers/student film awards party, *Manhattan Night* special screening and after party (Ridgefield Playhouse, Saturday, May 21 at 7 PM) and the RIFF Awards (Keeler Tavern, Sunday, May 22 at 2 PM), as well as the filmmakers' lounge. 




